
April 2022

- 610 likely November 2022 voters
- Conducted March 8-12, 2022 via landline, cell phone, and text-to-web
- Margin of error = +/- 4.0 percentage points

- Voters are extremely dissatisfied with the way things are going in Portland, likely making them more amenable to proposed changes.
- Each proposal begins with broad majority support with the ballot language we tested.
- RCV and multi-member district proposals are unlikely to damage form of government reform, and in fact start off stronger than form of government.
 - There is little difference in support between those who heard form of government before or after the other proposals.
 - A majority of voters believe we should make all three changes instead of solely focusing on form of government.










Ranked-Choice Voting Is Broadly Popular

Should the City Charter be amended to elect the Mayor and City Council using ranked choice voting, **allowing voters to rank** candidates in order of preference?




Support Is Steady When Voters Hear More Info

Initial: **73-23**

"Yes" vote would amend Portland City Charter to specify that all elected officials of the city be elected by a process known as ranked choice voting that would allow voters to rank candidates in order of preference, using those rankings to elect candidates in a single election.

"No" vote retains current system where a candidate is elected with more than fifty percent of the vote in the primary; if no candidate receives more than fifty percent in the primary, the two candidates with the most votes compete in a run-off in the general election.




Multi-Member District Proposal Also Popular

Multi-Member District Proposal Remains Popular After Yes/No Statements


Multi-Member Vote With Info

If the election were held today, would you vote "yes" or "no" on this measure?




Slight Growth For PRCV With Yes/No Statements

Initial: **70-23**

"Yes" vote would amend the Portland City Charter to specify all elected officials of the city be elected by a process known as ranked choice voting; allow voters to rank candidates in order of preference; elect three City Councilors per District; Mayor elected citywide.

"No" vote retains the current system where a candidate is elected with more than fifty percent of the vote in the primary; if no candidate receives more than fifty percent in the primary, the two candidates with the most votes compete in a run-off in the general election; four City Commissioners are elected citywide, voters choose one candidate per commission seat.




Form Of Government Reform Strong

Combined Initial Form Of Government Vote


Should the City's governance structure be changed to have the city managed by City Manager, appointed and overseen by elected City Council?

No Evidence That Hearing Other Measures Damages Form Of Government




Growth For Form Of Government With Yes/No Statements

Combined Form Of Gov. Vote With Info

Initial: **63-26**

"Yes" vote would amend the Portland City Charter to create a City Manager to run bureaus, administer laws, and budget; City Manager appointed by Mayor with approval of majority of City Council.

"No" vote retains current form of city government where each Bureau is overseen by the Mayor or a City Commissioner, which also passes laws and budget.




Majority Of Voters Believe We Should Pass The Whole Package

We should only focus on changing Portland's form of government – not reforms to how we elect local leaders and how many members represent each district that distract from the main issue.






Voters Of Color Most Supportive Of Whole Package
